BROMMOMENTS

BROMELIAD BASICS by Jeanette Robertson

This is the handout that accompanied Jeanette's very informative presentation at the February meeting.

The **Bromeliaceae** family of 3000 species and over 6000 cultivars, is divided into 3 subfamilies, which are, in turn, divided into groups or **genera**.

Genus	group of related species (plural – genera) e.g. Aechmea
Bi-generic	cross between species of different genera e.g. xNeomea is a cross between a Neoregelia and an Aechmea
Species	plant evolved in the wild, and is collected from habitat. Seed from this plant will produce an identical plant.
Hybrid	plant developed when pollen from one plant is deposited onto the stigma of another; seed produced will grow a plant with characteristics of both parent, and identical plants are only produced by offsets, not seeds
Stigma	sticky female part of the flower
Anther	pollen box on stamen (male part of flower)
Offset / pup	shoot from base of plant, develops into new plant
Cultivar	produced or evolved in cultivation, as opposed to growing in habitat
Sport	naturally occurring mutation, producing plant of non-typical form
Clone	group of plants produced as offsets from a single parent plant
Epiphytic	attaches to another plant or object, but is not a parasite
Xerophytic	grows in arid conditions
Saxicolous	grows on rocks
Terrestrial	grows in ground (or in pot of mix)
Stomata	small pores on leaves of bromeliads through which they breathe and feed
Scurf	scale-like plates on many bromeliads, protects from drying out. Crown: base of plant where roots attach
Meristem	central growing part of plant
Inflorescence	part of plant that holds flower; includes scape (stem), bracts (coloured leaf - like parts)
Variiegation	lengthwise stripes on leaves, due to varying amounts of pigment
Albomarginata	white edges to leaves, due to lack of pigment

WRITING NAMES

The **genus** is always written with a capital e.g. *Aechmea*, *Tillandsia*.

Species are written in lower case e.g. *Aechmea fasciata*, *Tillandsia capitata*.

Hybrids are written starting with a capital, then lower case, and in single inverted commas e.g. *Neoregelia* 'Passion', *Aechmea* 'Fascini'.

Bigeneric hybrids are preceded by an 'x', eg *xNeomea* 'Stardust', *xNeophytum* 'Galactic Warrior'.

DID YOU KNOW

Copper is poisonous to bromeliads. Most fungicides contain copper.

Yates brand 'Mancozeb plus' is safe to use on bromeliads.

Treated timber contains copper, so keep well away from bromeliads.

Most scale sprays are based on white oil which clogs the stomata on bromeliad leaves and kills the plant. For fly-speck scale, use 'Chemspray Rogor' or 'Anti-scale', or 'Natrasoap' or Lorsban. Rogor for treating scale can burn inside the cup if not washed out after 24 hours.

Genera with similar cultural requirements are best grouped together in the garden or shade house. Aechmeas, Neoregelias and Billbergias need high light to develop good colour and form; they require enough water to flush out the central cup, and they need minimal fertilizer, so they grow well together. On the other hand, Vrieseas, Guzmanias and Nidulariums generally prefer shadier positions with higher humidity, and benefit from a stronger fertilizing regimen than most other bromeliads.

In the garden, bromeliads may be planted in the pot – just plant the pot to about three parts of its depth, then take your mulch to the top of the pot. When offsets need to be removed, or the plant replaced with another, it is easily lifted from the garden.

Len presented our first Brommoments for the year. It was interesting to hear how he grows some plants purely for display purposes. You only have to look at the Waites plants – and drool. They have perfected the art of presentation.

Kayleen Courtney found this interesting information on the web.

Normally a grass pup or other bromeliad offset or pup that has come away from the mother plant without its whole base is doomed to slowly rot away, however, if it is dropped into the water of another bromeliad cup, it at least has a chance of not only surviving, but of also forming roots. Alcantarea are the best as they have the most room in their cups, or leaf bases. The water in the cup of tank type bromeliads is said to contain anti bacterial and hormonal secretions which prevents the offset rotting, stimulates growth, and encourages root development.

Another point to consider is what is referred to as a 'rooting season'. All plants respond to lengthening and shortening days. Growth slows during the shortening days, but as the days lengthen the plants put on growth, and this is also when they are more likely to produce new roots.
