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STUDY GROUP



In June I arranged the attendees for the photo shoot! They are a right bunch. We had a great time at Beryl and Barrie's home. It was lovely to see the changes to the garden. They are certainly doing a wonderful job at updating their garden. Barrie has been entering our novice section at the meetings and doing very well! Again we held a lively discussion on mixes and medications. At our meeting in August we have decided to have one of our panel discussions focussing on pesticides.



The July study group was at Kayleens. Such a beautifully maintained garden and bush house. Both Dale and Kayleen have been busy and there were striking changes to the garden. Members were seen scoffing down fresh peas as walked around the grounds and carrying pumpkins down the driveway when they left.



Deanna brought along an interesting plant. Here are the top and side views. It is a *Cryptanthus bivitatus* and the plant is happy with all the pups struggling to the top of the flask. She has not treated the plant with any special fertilisers or fungus treatment.



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Kayleen provided a *Vriesea guttata* for repotting. Len as per usual was more than equal to the task. He requested a knife, unpotted the plant, looked and felt all around the top of the mix, found a natural break and halved the plant. He was then able to deal with the 2 sections individually. The mother plant still had a viable leaf and was maintaining an offset even though her original offsets had all strong offsets of their own. Members all took home a piece if they desired as Kayleen had a plant that was even more daunting in her bush house which she was prepared to tackle later.





MEMBER NEWS

May guest speaker George Stamatis on Alcantareas.

George started growing in South Africa, came to Australia and studied botany and is now a very informative person on bromeliads with a very strong interest in Alcantarea.

George separated his talk into 2 sections. The first section dealt with the scientific characteristics of Alcantarea. He explained the difference from Vriesea and talked about the large recurved petals and the often fragrant flowers with their protruding pistil and anthers. He noted the difference of the seeds. The Alcantarea have a bigger coarser seed, as the seeds are designed to drop from cliffs. The plants are large – over 1 foot in diameter, with tall and branched inflorescences with multiple spikes. The hair pups (adventitious pups) usually appear before flowering, some will pup in the rosettes, some are monocarpic. *Alcantarea imperialis* is monocarpic (can only be grown from seed), and many of the imperialis crosses may be monocarpic too. There are estimated to be around 250 species and there is great diversity within the species. *Alcantarea nahoumii* has 2 forms – large and small, *Alcantarea odorata* has many different clones with the Bullis clone being particularly good.

The second section dealt with the growing conditions. Alcantarea cannot tolerate frost but cold is OK. They need seasonal changes to initiate blooming. This seasonal change can be either temperature change or rainfall change. They will often stack if grown close to the Equator. They require as much light as possible with *geniculata, regina* and *odorata* requiring a bit more shade. Soft water is best as there are less minerals. Do not let the tank and leaf axils dry out. Feed with osmacote initially and sparingly after that. Do not feed after the initial

growth spurts. Let them become chunky and hardy and colourful. Initial heavy feeding of variegated Alcantarea gives good colour and form. Propogate by seeds or offsets. Keep lightly shaded and humid.





June guest speaker Barry Genn on Tillandsias.

Barry Genn grows his Tillandsias in Queensland and is a Tillnut! He brought in a box full of Tillandsias to show us.

Tillandsia grows well on Callistemon and Melaleuca. Barrry finds that the roots grow into the wood and the seeds are hard to remove so he prefers coconut fibre..Pine rots away too quickly.

The plants can be attached using many products such as Chux, thin strips of stocking

Plants that clump well from seedlings are *stricta*, *dura*, *duratii*, *sprengeliana*. *cacticola*, *butzii*, *tenuifolia*, *bulbosa*.

Viable seed looks brown and fluffy when the pod is open. If green and fluffy the seed is not ready. If black and smelly the seed is rotten.

For cold tender plants put a solid cover over them at night.
